CRITERION I – CURRICULAR ASPECTS

1.1 - Curriculum Planning and Implementation

1.1.1 – Institution has the mechanism for well planned curriculum delivery and documentation. Explain in 500 words

The Ahmednagar College is a minority institution affiliated to Savitribai Phule Pune University and adheres to the curriculum designed and prescribed by the university. Towards framing of this curriculum many senior faculty members contribute as members of board of studies or as subject experts and input their suggestion. Further, faculties also are invited as subject expert to different colleges and institutions to contribute to syllabus designing. The Ahmednagar College has an effective mechanism for better delivery of curriculum: - 1. At the session beginning each department conducts departmental meeting with workload, subject distribution and time table and as a goal sheet faculty members prepare teaching plan. 2. Topics of subject and credits to be given are discussed as well and file submission is taken as a part of this initiation. 3. Students are informed about syllabus and subject at the time of admission through prospectus, and orientation lectures held in department on first day. The college also provides college calendar as a part of academic session opening and closing. 4. Students from SY and TY and PG are categorized as slow and advanced learners, as the result of previous examination is declared. 5. The Ahmednagar College has a rich central Library with open access to staff members and students once library card has been issued. 6. Teaching methods adopted by staff members in classroom are based on the needs of students and subjects and are changed accordingly. Some of them are : - a. Traditional approach (chalk and board) b. ICT based teaching c. Assignments d. Group discussions e. Power point Presentations by students f. Project Work g. Seminars and workshops h. Guest lectures i. Field work j. Internship k. Practical lab experiments Regular Term - end examination and mid terms and internals or class test are conducted at departmental level and institute level. Regular assessment and evaluation are done by teachers to keep a track on the progress of students understanding of subject and syllabus. The examination department helps with the term end examination while internal and class test are conducted at department level. A proper record is maintained for all the afore said points at departmental level.

The Individual departments recognize differential requirements of students by way of presentation competitions, class assignments, home assignments, class tests, etc. Students are mentored by interactive sessions other than the regular classroom. They are attended by the faculty by way of extra lectures and notes and ppt's, The teachers help these students by way of using simple bilingual teaching method. Students are provided with advanced information and challenging issues depending on their subjects of interest. They are encouraged to participate in various competitions. Apart from this the departments as a part of their academics consists of Personality development and soft skills to train such diverse students. Students are made to undertake a project for their self introspection SELF SWOT analysis as a part of mentoring they are made to analyze themselves and discuss about their weakness and challenges / threats they might face and the remedies to overcome these threats. Departments help students to improve in learning by conducting tests (MCQ based, written test open book test) multiple times. Students are encouraged for group discussions on syllabus related topic for gaining the knowledge from others. Students are encouraged for participation in various poster competitions, workshops, seminars and conferences so as to expose them with new horizon of knowledge. Students are taken for industrial visits where they interact with the eminent scientists and discuss queries. By Organizing exhibitions students are also promoted to participate and communicate with one another help in developing new ideas. The departments helps the students to improve learning by way of presentations, class assignments, home tutorials. Frequent field visits are arranged to make the students aware of local and different regions. Experimental Learning along with problem solving methods are also used. Students are given large number of experiments through practical courses. Participative learning is encouraged. Students are mentored by interactive sessions apart from regular classroom. Departments try to bridge the gap between the students and teachers by conducting Questionnaire sessions to clarify doubts. Different approaches like quiz games, Role play and Brainstorming Group Problem Solving lectures are conducted. Departments also creates better environment in college, where students can approach different faculty teachers for both educational and personal guidance. Students are made aware and support them for higher studies and career options. Students are given support and advice for improvement in academic performance by giving special attention. Most importantly the teachers inspire the students in such a way that they learn through their own experience, efforts and understanding. Students are also made to develop the habit of logical and rational thinking for more effective teaching. Students are encouraged to ask questions and participate actively. Whenever the new topic is introduced, the related fundamental concepts are imprinted in the minds of the students. After the admission of students the overall performance in terms general awareness, hidden talent, fluency in language can be understood when we arranged welcome function for the students. Staffs of the departments encourage the advanced learner to take participation in various examinations e.g. NET, SET, etc.

2.5.2 – Reforms initiated on Continuous Internal Evaluation(CIE) system at the institutional level (250 words)

As a part of CIE the departments undertakes class test, and internal examination before the commencement of University semester examination. The academic calendar specifies the internal exam conducted twice a year. These examinations are further evaluated and CIE being 20 marks and end semester exams being evaluated in 80 marks. As for PG the ratio differs where CIE being 50 marks and semester being 50 marks. The Department also measures the academic progress of the students through presentation (PPT), group discussions home assignments, project making, and class tests. Evaluation and result analysis helps teachers to analyze student progress in specific subject. Parents Teachers meet helps us convey these progresses of pupil. Academic feedback system helps us determine the acceptability of syllabus to students. Students are informed in advance for internal assessment patterns like written examination, assignments, seminar and group discussion. The department's displays time table for the same on notice boards time to time. Teacher guide students to implement writing skill in answer sheet by adding neat, labeled diagrams. Students are free to ask their queries regarding assessment done and

discuss their difficulties they face during study. Teacher again asks students to solve the same test papers after guidance as assignment. Departments inform student's attendance and academic performance regularly by arranging personal meet with students and their parents. Internal assessment, or curriculum embedded assessment, evaluates what students do when they are in the classroom. Internal assessment serves as basis for conceptual development. Individual Departments implements strategy as per the convenience.

2.5.3 – Academic calendar prepared and adhered for conduct of Examination and other related matters (250 words)

The institute adheres to the Academic Calendar provided by the Savitribai Phule Pune University. Each year we prepare the academic calendar for the institute and also for individual department for activity schedule for the smooth functioning of examination and related activities. The individual departments maintain an Academic Plan before the beginning of each academic year. The New Academic year begins on 15 June and ends on 30 April. Details in respect to various activities to be undertaken like guest lectures, parent teacher meet, internal examination, University examination, counseling, extension series and industry interaction etc., are included. Teachers are informed about schedules mentioned in the academic calendar to prepare their teaching plan accordingly. The dates of internal assessment tests are announced, well in advance by bringing out notices for students. The Schedule dates of Filling examination forms and the actual University examinations (Theory Practical) are announced to the students by displaying the notices/circulars issued by University on student's notice board. The schedule of events mentioned in academic calendar can be changed, if needed, after consultation of concerned teachers/ students by the head of the department. In the institute the individual departments are keeping their own academic calendars for students benefit regarding the schedule of various examinations that will be conducted in the academic year. The academic calendar helps keep a track on the functioning of the departments and thereby serves as a goal sheet (short term goal). This facilitates the extra initiatives that need to be taken for the future improvisations.

The college has a simple mechanism for maintenance and upkeep of the facilities. The Physical facilities are maintained by college administration that has a team of contractors, supervisors, plumber, electrician, gardener, sweeper and carpenter. Optimum working condition of all properties/ equipments on campus is ensured. It includes Generator, Solar panels, Air conditioners, Xerox machine, CCTV cameras, Water Purifier and Inverters. Maintenance of these facilities is done regularly as per the requirements. All stakeholders have equal opportunity to use these facilities as per the rules and policies of the institution. The College has agreement with Security agency for campus security. Campus maintenance is maintained through surveillance cameras. The computer network assistant provides regular support services relating to computer hardware and software. Computer facility is made available for the students in working hours. The college website is maintained regularly by AMC with Satyam Prints, Ahmednagar The College ensures maximum utilization of

facilities such as classrooms by framing a time table, displaying it onto the notice board where time slots for each class are allotted before the commencement of semester. Classrooms are cleaned daily by non teaching staff of the concern departments. The college also gets the wash rooms and common rooms cleaned on daily basis. Seminar Hall, recreational hall and Conference rooms are allocated by the Registrar of the college for different activities. These are maintained and cleaned from time to time. The College space is also allocated to External Users on basis of request through email or requisition letter. College Space and classrooms are allocated for following activities: a. Elections for local bodies, legislative assembly and parliament. b. College ground for different tournaments c. Class rooms and computer rooms for offline and online competitive exams by government organizations and corporations Separate labs are allotted for UG PG students based on time table. Research labs are utilized by PhD students. Standard safety procedures are followed for handling chemicals, acids and various other equipments. Regular cleaning and maintaining of equipments is done by the lab assistants. The College ensures effective utilization and maintenance of library through library committee. Books are issued to the students on their issue cards and I cards. Fine is charged for overdue books. The library remains open for 8 hours on all working days. During examination period, the reading room is open from 7.00 am to 6.00 pm. Pest control of library books is done every year. There are 3 girls' hostel 4 boy's hostel in the campus. College has MoU with Booth Hospital for medical facility. There are 5 canteens in the campus providing mess facility. RCDA is well equipped with all resources for differently abled students. The college provides quarters for staff in the campus. The college has spacious individual playgrounds for indoor and outdoor games. The sports infrastructure is been used by the students who are interested in taking part in sports. Gymnasium has weight lifting, powerlifting sets and multistation weight training machinery. 8. Future Plans of Actions for Next Academic Year
